Jean Shen believes in happiness being a part and parcel of success. Her positivity builds a vibrant energy field around her and touches everyone who meets her.

Jean's academic journey has been like a mosaic. It is made up of many parts, every bit shiny and distinctive, and yet cohesive with her Asian roots.

"I was studying at the Guangdong University of Foreign Studies when I applied for the Hinrich Foundation Global Trade Leader Scholarship" Jean said. "I was one of the lucky people to have Hinrich Foundation award me with a full scholarship to finish my final two years at Hong Kong Baptist University (HKBU) where I graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in International Journalism Studies.

"Although I had to study away from my family, I took heart in the fact that my parents were very supportive of all my decisions, unlike many other Chinese parents."

Embracing diversity

Adapting to the cosmopolitan environment in Hong Kong, and having classmates and peers from different places, she slowly started absorbing the diversity of cultures around her.

After graduation in 2005, she joined B2B eCommerce platform, Global Sources, as a Market Analyst.

After a 6-month training in Shenzhen, she relocated to the Qingdao office where she worked for two years. Jean said: "Studying at HKBU taught me how to see things with a different perspective and how to relate to people who

belonged to diverse cultures and who were radically different from me. HKBU proved to be a good training ground for me to learn about diversity, a lesson I used while working for multicultural organizations like Global Sources, which facilitates trade among people in countries around the world. I cultivated better understanding of the global buyer community."

As she progressed in her career with Global Sources, Jean realized she had to better equip herself to assume bigger roles, so she decided to pursue an MBA degree.

In 2007, she applied for Thunderbird School of Global Management (now a part of Arizona State University) and was granted a scholarship offered by the Thunderbird Alumni Fund for Asian Students and the Hinrich Foundation.

"Since the program I was taking at Thunderbird was focused on international management, students came from all over the globe, including Canada, Mexico, Peru, India, Thailand, Russia, Japan, South Korea, Turkey, Malaysia and the Philippines," Jean said.

"My experiences in the US had a huge impact on my life, particularly after seeing how everyone is treated equally despite differences in race and culture. As I learned to appreciate other cultures, somewhere along the road, I learned to appreciate my own culture as well."

Jean said she learned the most important lesson of all: That respect was the key to most human interactions. She realized that if she put could put her feet into other people's shoes, what seemed alien to her culture would become easy to understand. She became receptive to different ideas and values of those around her.

Gaining traction

Upon returning to Global Sources as a management trainee, Jean was stationed in Singapore for six months where she engaged in projects aiming to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of Global Sources Online, which would result in generating sales leads among suppliers and buyers. "I am a person who thrives on challenges, responsibilities and opportunities," Jean said. "My niche is being able to continually develop my business acumen, cross-cultural communication skills, quick adaptation of new technologies and being a life-long learner."

Jean also had an opportunity to lead the Global Sources Private Sourcing Events team in Shenzhen to help international top retailers find the right suppliers. She arranged productive meetings for buyers, which sourced the right vendors and suppliers from China, the Philippines, Vietnam and other developing Asia economies. It was a win-win situation for the suppliers too, as new business opportunities were created for them, thus propagating global trade.

"The opportunity that the Hinrich Foundation and Global Sources gave me had a huge impact on my academic journey, and, in a broader perspective, business communities. I am grateful that I had the privilege of contributing in an international environment and in small ways that helped bring about trade that improved many underprivileged lives in developing economies."

Life-long learner

When she took time off to focus on personal life, Jean planned to learn coding. She did not plan to be a programmer but got hooked to the technology in a big way.

"In early 2018, coding was just something fun for me to use to step into the tech world. But as I learn more about coding and the tech community behind it, I realize that the technology field is very dynamic and comprises all the new things that I am really passionate about and excited to learn," Jean said.

Ever the learner, Jean envisions herself amid new technologies and new learnings in the future. Currently employed as a Customer Engineer at Mode
